Past Projects

Creek Clean-Ups and Restoration:

- * Every Spring and Fall, we organized volunteers to haul trash and junk out of our creeks and off of our roadsides.
- * We made *Grapplers* available to members who wished to clean year-round.
- * We completed several tree plantings throughout the watershed to improve soil and water retention.

Creek Area Encampments: We worked with the Centro Laboral de Graton to provide environmental education to migrant workers with the goal of moving the creekside encampments to less sensitive upland areas.

Surface and Groundwater Monitoring: We supported a variety of efforts at monitoring our surface and ground water to protect the region's aquifer.

Education and Outreach:

- * We offered a semester-long storm water education program in fourth grade classrooms at Oak Grove School in Graton each year.
- * We provided watershed maps and associated educational materials to every school in our watershed.
- * We co-created the QUEST adventure in Ragle Ranch Regional Park.
- * We organized community workshops regarding watershed health and regulations, and we distributed information at community events.

Protection: We worked with landowners, local government, and conservation groups to protect sensitive areas from development.

Let's plant more native trees in our watershed to provide habitat for birds and other wildlife, to shade our creeks and homes, and to keep our soil from running off to the sea.


